THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (B) - 14TH NOVEMBER 2021



This Sunday, 14th November is Remembrance Sunday when we commemorate the contribution of British and Commonwealth military and civilian servicemen and women in the two World Wars and since. The Day is kept on the second Sunday in November, the Sunday nearest to 11th November, Armistice Day, the end of hostilities in the First World War in 1918. It is usually kept by two minutes' silence at 11 am. Across the land, there will be numerous ceremonies at local war memorials in most cities, towns and villages, attended by civic dignitaries, ex-servicemen and women, members of the Royal British Legion and other veterans' organisations, and members of local armed forces regular and reserve units, military cadet forces and youth organisations such as the Boys and Girls Brigades. Representatives of the Judiciary lay wreaths at local War Memorials throughout the country. Wreaths of remembrance poppies are laid on the memorials. The reason poppies are used to remember those who have given their lives in battle is because in the midst of the filth and mud in the fields of Flanders, they were the flowers which, despite it all, grew on the battlefields.

THIS SUNDAY'S LITURGY

In the Gospel (Mark 13:24-32), Jesus tells us about the last days, and about his return at the end of time. Our faith in the second coming of Christ corresponds to a very deep aspiration in the human heart: the longing for life free from sin and death, the longing for justice, the longing for love and mercy. All these desires are planted in us, and will be finally fulfilled on that day, when we see God face to face in the light of glory.

PLENARY INDULGENCE - NOVEMBER

A Catholic who wishes to obtain a plenary indulgence must also fulfil the ordinary conditions of an indulgence, which are: 1. Sacramental Confession. 2. Reception of the Eucharist. 3. Prayer for the intentions of the Pope. Sacramental confession and reception of the Eucharist can occur within a week of the indulgenced act.

In the month of November, the Church has two traditional means of obtaining a plenary indulgence for the souls in Purgatory: 1. To visit a cemetery and pray for the dead during the Octave of All Saints' Day, which is 1st - 8th November. 2. To piously visit a church or oratory on the Feast of All Souls' Day, 2nd November and recite the Our Father and the Creed. Both indulgences must include the three ordinary conditions and full detachment from sin.

The Vatican also said that, because of the pandemic, the elderly, the sick, and others who cannot leave the house for serious reasons can participate in the indulgence from home by reciting prayers for the deceased before an image of Jesus or the Virgin Mary. They must also spiritually unite themselves to other Catholics, be completely detached from sin, and have the intention of fulfilling the ordinary conditions as soon as possible. The Vatican's decree offered examples of prayers that homebound Catholics can pray for the dead, including lauds or vespers of the Office for the Dead, the Rosary, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, other prayers for deceased among their family or friends, or performing a work of mercy by offering their pain and discomfort to God.

ST ALBERT, PATRON OF STUDENTS AND SCIENTISTS

Next Monday, 15th November is the Memorial of St Albert the Great (1200 - 1280), the teacher of St Thomas Aguinas and a mediaeval scientist and man of great learning. He came from Swabia and while studying at the University of Padua in 1223, he rejected his inheritance and joined the recently founded Dominican order. After his own studies, he spent his time teaching theology, mainly in Cologne, where he tutored St Thomas Aguinas and guickly became known and respected for his erudition and understanding. Albert recognised early the genius of his pupil and the two men became close friends and intellectual soulmates, until Aquinas's death in 1274. Both were pioneers of the scholastic method of learning, applying the principles of Aristotle to theology and insisting on the separate but interrelated nature of faith and reason. In 1254. Albert was appointed the Prior Provincial of the Dominicans and personal theologian to the pope, but he was unsuited to administration and in 1257 resigned. He returned to study and developed a systematic curriculum for the Dominicans. In 1260, against his wishes, he was appointed the Bishop of Ratisbon, a post he held the sea for two years but again finding himself unsuited to administration, he resigned and returned to teaching and writing. At the Council of Lyons in 1274, he called for reconciliation between the Eastern churches and Rome. In 1278, a memory lapse signified the start of a degenerative illness that led two years later to his death in Cologne. He left an immense legacy of writings on a vast variety of subjects, together with an enduring tradition of philosophical analysis. Albert was canonised in 1931 and declared a doctor at the church by Pius XI, who also named him patron of students and patron of the natural sciences.

ST EDMUND OF ABINGDON - 16TH NOVEMBER

Next Tuesday, 16th November is the Solemnity of St Edmund of Abingdon (1175 - 1240), the joint principal patron of our Diocese of Portsmouth. Born in Berkshire on 30th Happy Feastday! November 1175, Edmund was the eldest son of the wealthy merchant Reginald Rich. Even from an early age, Edmund was renowned for his piety. Educated at the universities of Oxford and Paris, he returned after graduation to teach art and mathematics at Oxford. Ordained after receiving his doctorate in theology, he went on to teach and soon became known for his preaching and personal holiness. He became Chancellor of the University. In 1222, he was appointed Canon and treasurer of Salisbury Cathedral, then in process of construction. Five years later, Pope Gregory XI commissioned him to preach throughout England in favour of the Sixth Crusade against the Saracens and shortly afterwards appointed him the Archbishop of Canterbury. As Archbishop, Edmund became an adviser to King Henry III and successfully performed several diplomatic missions including arbitration between the king and his nobles, averting a civil war. He did not greatly enjoy administration and diplomacy, but he threw himself wholeheartedly into the task of ecclesiastical reform. He gathered together some capable helpers such as Richard of Chichester and resisted the intrusion of court politics into the running of the He protested loudly against Henry's appointment of a papal legate for England and this brought him into conflict with the monastic chapter of Canterbury, who, supported by King Henry, resisted his authority. Further disputes arose between Edmund and the king. The Archbishop condemned the king's practice of leaving sees vacant whilst collecting their revenues for the crown. In 1240, he left England for Rome, but died at Soissy near the Cistercian Abby of Pontigny, where he was buried. Despite his troubled rule, Edmund's personal goodness and holiness was never doubted, nor his good intentions. He left behind a simple but comprehensive programme for spiritual growth called the Speculum Ecclesiae, which was originally written for monks but which gained much popularity among the laity in the following centuries. He was canonised in 1246, and his cult spread across southern England, as exemplified by the dedication of St. Edmund's Hall, Oxford in the late thirteenth century.
