ALL SAINTS - SUNDAY, 31ST OCTOBER 2021

This Sunday, 31st October is the great Solemnity of All Saints (a Holy Day transferred this year to Sunday from Monday, 1st November). On this day, the Church venerates all those known and unknown, whose virtues and efforts in this life are considered to have earned them an eternal reward from God. In doing so, we the Church on earth traditionally give thanks for their lives, consider their example, strive to emulate them, ask for their intercession in the trials of this life, and glorify God through the multitude that have gone before us, remembering that we too are all called to be saints. Veneration of saints is giving glory to God in them and through them. Their graces are God's gift to them and their example is our hope. This feast also reminds us that great saints who have their own feast days, like these ones who do not, have come from all states and walks of life: clergy and lay, married and single, humble and mighty. Today, beatifications and canonizations are of people from a great variety of backgrounds and countries, and it is possible to form a more comprehensive view of what constitutes the universal holiness of the Church. In the early centuries, martyrs alone were venerated as saints and a feast of "the Martyrs of all the Earth" was celebrated in the East in the mid-fourth century. The feast caught on in the West, especially after Pope Boniface IV dedicated the Pantheon in Rome in 610 to Saint Mary and All the Saints. Subsequently, Pope Gregory IV (d. 844) formally fixed 1st November as the date for this feast.

ALL SOULS - TUESDAY, 2ND NOVEMBER

We honour and pray for the dead, especially for our own departed loved ones. It is definitely a day when, if we can, we should attend Mass, offering it for the faithful departed. YouCat, the Youth Catechism of the Catholic Church (London, CTS: 2011) explains well what we pray for on 2nd November in two of its questions:

159 What is purgatory? Purgatory, often imagined as a place, is actually a condition. Someone who dies in God's grace (and therefore at peace with God and people) but who still needs purification before he can see God face to face is in purgatory. When Peter had betrayed Jesus, the Lord turned around and looked at Peter: "And Peter went out and wept bitterly" - a feeling like being in purgatory. Just such a purgatory probably awaits most of us at the moment of our death: the Lord looks at us full of love - and we experience burning shame and painful remorse over our wicked or "merely" unloving behaviour. Only after this purifying pain will we be capable of meeting his loving gaze in untroubled heavenly joy.

160 Can we help the departed who are in the condition of purgatory? Yes, since all those who are baptized into Christ form one communion and are united with one another, the living can also help the souls of the faithful departed in purgatory. When a man is dead, he can do nothing more for himself. The time of active probation is past. But we can do something for the faithful departed in purgatory. Our love extends into the afterlife. Through our fasting, prayers, and good works, but especially through the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, we can obtain grace for the departed.

MASS OF REMEMBRANCE

A Mass of Remembrance will be celebrated at 12 noon and at 7 pm on Tuesday for the repose of the souls of all the faithful departed parishioners since March 2020. All are welcome to these two Masses to remember loved ones. *May They All Rest in Peace.*

PLENARY INDULGENCE - NOVEMBER

A Catholic who wishes to obtain a plenary indulgence must also fulfil the ordinary conditions of an indulgence, which are: 1. Sacramental Confession. 2. Reception of the Eucharist. 3. Prayer for the intentions of the Pope. Sacramental confession and reception of the Eucharist can occur within a week of the indulgenced act.

In the month of November, the Church has two traditional means of obtaining a plenary indulgence for the souls in Purgatory: 1. To visit a cemetery and pray for the dead during the Octave of All Saints' Day, which is 1st - 8th November. 2. To piously visit a church or oratory on the Feast of All Souls' Day, 2nd November and recite the Our Father and the Creed. Both indulgences must include the three ordinary conditions and full detachment from sin.

The Vatican also said that, because of the pandemic, the elderly, the sick, and others who cannot leave the house for serious reasons can participate in the indulgence from home by reciting prayers for the deceased before an image of Jesus or the Virgin Mary.

They must also spiritually unite themselves to other Catholics, be completely detached from sin, and have the intention of fulfilling the ordinary conditions as soon as possible.

The Vatican's decree offered examples of prayers that homebound Catholics can pray for the dead, including lauds or vespers of the Office for the Dead, the Rosary, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, other prayers for deceased among their family or friends, or performing a work of mercy by offering their pain and discomfort to God.

GREETINGS FROM BAMENDA

On behalf of All the members of Christ's faithful here in the Archdiocese of Bamenda, I send fraternal greetings to our Sister Church in the Diocese of Portsmouth. As the third metropolitan Archbishop of Bamenda, by the grace of God and the choice of the Apostolic See, I thank God for this link and the fruits it has borne for both churches in the over forty years. As we look forward to the celebration of the golden jubilee of this link, it is my vision that our link goes more to the evangelisation of our peoples through the exchange of human and spiritual resources.

When I heard how each year the diocese of Portsmouth dedicates a Sunday, not only to pray, but also to raise funds for the development and growth of the faith in the Archdiocese of Bamenda, I was so touched and moved by the gesture. Apart from this, during the socio-political crisis that we have been going through since 2016, I have got reports how the whole church in Portsmouth have been journeying with us spiritually, supporting us financially, and clergy and people petitioning to Her Majesty's Government through its parliamentary representatives to look for a lasting solution to our problem. Moved by these charitable acts, I have decided also to institute a Portsmouth Sunday to be celebrated here in the whole Archdiocese of Bamenda on the very day Bamenda Sunday is celebrated in Portsmouth. Our people here in Bamenda also need to pray and think of ways of supporting you too in your own challenges. We may not be able to reach your standards; but in our own way, we will be able to show a sign of solidarity with you in your own challenges. Covid-19 has revealed the poverty of humanity, no matter where we find ourselves on planet earth. The people of Bamenda need to learn to journey with you, not only in sending priests as you have them now in Portsmouth, but in other areas of evangelisation which our young Church can also help to inspire in Portsmouth. Hence, Portsmouth Sunday will be an opportunity for us to pray and reflect on other ways in which Bamenda can also be of more assistance to you our sister diocese.

Sharing our pastoral life is of paramount importance, and I am looking at a situation where our Catholic Women, Catholic Men, Youth and other groups will share their experiences of faith with their corresponding groups in the Diocese of Portsmouth, as brothers and sisters without making any material demands. As you well know, the Socio-Political crisis in the Anglophone area is now in its fifth year and we are very far from reaching a solution.

One of the greatest challenges facing us now is the revival of our schools and reinstating them to their glory before the socio-political situation we found ourselves in since 2016. Although parish life has continued unhindered in the whole of the archdiocese of Bamenda, with even more parishes and Eucharistic Centres created, our schools have suffered a lot because the main tool used by those craving for federation or the independence of the Southern Cameroons was the boycott of schools. While we did our utmost to keep schools going, we succeeded more in Bamenda, the regional capital since there was some security. Because most of the fighting between government forces and the 'Amba Boys' concentrated more in rural areas, there was mass exodus into Bamenda and other secured towns and villages in French Speaking Cameroon. Not only did schools stop totally, most of the buildings and infrastructures have dilapidated. In Bamenda town, make-shift structures were created in some of our primary schools and even secondary schools to accommodate students fleeing from St. Bede's College, Ashing-Kom, John Paul II Comprehensive College, Wum, St. Joseph's Comprehensive College, Mbengwi and St. Benedict XVI's Comprehensive College, Widikum. As for primary education, they have been almost inexistent out of the Bamenda town area since 2016.

The good news now is that schools are gradually resuming in almost all parts of the archdiocese and many families are returning to their homes and areas of resident prior to the beginning of the crisis. There is, therefore, the need to rehabilitate the schools' buildings and infrastructures that have been abandoned in the last 5 years and employment of more teachers, considering that with the closures of schools and lack of money to pay teachers, some have looked for greener pastures elsewhere. Unlike in the UK, teachers are paid solely from the meagre school fees children have to pay for their tuition. Also, the new schools opened in Bamenda town, as they expand at terrific speed need more structures equipment in order to accommodate the high enrolment and some of the students would not want to go back to their respective towns and villages. An example can be seen in the St Joseph's Comprehensive Secondary School opened last year in a section of the primary school here at the Cathedral premises run by Fr Bonaventure, who served at St John Bosco's parish in Woodley, Reading. Last year, the first year of its existence, there were just over 300 students. This year, its enrolment has gone over 600. There is dire need, therefore, of constructing good classrooms.

Considering that as more IDPs return with increased security, I think that donations for the Bamenda Sunday would help a lot in reviving Catholic Education in the Archdiocese of the young. Justice has not been done to these children in the past 5 years. As a church, believing and knowing that education is a fundamental human right, we need to put our hands on deck and see how fast and far we can make right the errors of these past years.

I have forwarded to your Bishop and to the Chairperson of the Portsmouth/Bamenda Committee, copies of the five-year Strategic Plan of the Archdiocese of Bamenda, for both pastoral, spiritual and material growth. It is my sincere hope that you will journey with us through this plan, especially by your prayers. Once more, thanks a lot and I commend all of you into the hands of St Joseph, the Patron of the Archdiocese of Bamenda and to the Immaculate Conception, the Co-Patroness of the Archdiocese of Bamenda. +Andrew NKEA, Archbishop of Bamenda.
