TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (A) – 10TH/11TH OCTOBER 2020

Gospel Matthew 22:1-14

The Lord invites us all to his celebratory feast: Jesus himself had problems with invitations. Not that he disliked or refused them; rather the opposite. In the Gospels he accepts invitations whenever offered, is accused by his detractors of dining with public sinners, and even, as is the case with Zacchaeus, engineers an invitation before it has been offered. Nor is he always the easiest of guests. When dining with Pharisees, he never misses an opportunity to upbraid them for their behaviour, which might seem rather churlish in our polite world of dinner parties.

It is in his parables that Jesus faces up to the big problem in certain invitations. Normally, we would be only too eager to accept an invitation to an important event, but he gives examples of kings or lords holding prestigious weddings, and those invited refusing to come. Not only do they refuse to come, but can go so far as to maltreat and kill the messengers sent to tell them of the event. Today's story runs two parables together, one with the conclusion that all are to be invited now that the original guests have refused, the second to do with how we are expected to respond to an invitation with good faith. What Jesus is really exposing is how God constantly invites us to come and celebrate, and how we resolutely refuse.

God's invitation to us is to celebrate with God in the Eucharist. It is in this celebration that we make present once again the mysterious act of salvation brought about by Christ's suffering, death and resurrection. The format in which we celebrate is a mixture of the synagogue service, welcoming God's word among us, and the Last Supper at which Jesus anticipated, through the blessing and gift of the bread and wine, the sacrifice he was about to undergo.

Why are so many reluctant to accept the invitation? The reasons given may be similar to the parables. We have other more pressing, more important things to do. There is also a failure in us to appreciate the full nature of the celebration, and we sometimes blame the celebrant or the form the liturgy takes for our drifting away. The liturgy is too traditional, too modern, too boring, too dull – and in our modern need for entertainment, it can be all of these things. Any human attempt to express what is happening will fall short, though that does not take away the responsibility to try to catch something of the essence of God being among us as we gather in God's name. The problem is that if we do cut ourselves off in this way, we run the risk of becoming isolated and losing the sense of meaning in our lives. God does not abandon us, but when we abandon God, we certainly do not make God's attempt to love us any easier.

If you have COVID19 symptoms, immediately fill them in on the App so that an alert is sent to those you have been in contact with.

SAINT OF THE WEEK: ST TERESA - 15TH OCTOBER

Officially listed in the calendar as St Teresa of Jesus she is better known as Teresa of Avila, the city where she was born in 1515. Avila, or to give it its full name, Avila de los Caballeros (Avila of the Knights) is in Spain, about seventy miles northwest of Madrid.

Teresa joined the Carmelites in her early teens and after about twenty-five years, with the help of St Peter of Alcantara (her Spiritual Director) and St John of the Cross, reformed the Carmelite Order. Her outstanding works of theology led her to be declared a Doctor of the Church by St Pope Paul VI in 1970, the first female Doctor. She died in 1582 and was canonized forty years later by Pope Gregory XV and is one of the secondary patron saints of Spain (St James being the first). Teresa wrote many prayers and poems. A prayer written by her which many people pray in times of distress is:

Let nothing disturb you
Let nothing frighten you
All things are passing away
God never changes
Patience obtains all things
Whoever has God, lacks nothing
God alone suffices.

Saint Teresa of Avila is the patron saint of headache sufferers though I am not sure if that includes self-inflicted ones. St Teresa of Avila - pray for us. *Mike*.
